You could go for a night time walk. Talk to your child about all the things that you see along your walk when it is dark. Ask your child about the things they can see and talk about the changes that happen at night.




Can you find any animals on your walk? Talk about the type of animals you may find on your walk and why they would come out at night.

MATHEMATICS Challenge
